THIS WEEK @ FMC September 3-9, 2025

This summer at MennoCon25 (Mennonite Church USA convention) I attended a workshop presented by the Duke Center for Reconciliation. The presentation began with the powerful reminder that we can claim a strong foundation for hoping in reconciliation, because according to scripture reconciliation has already happened through the cross:

For in him [Jesus] all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross. (Colossians 1:19-20)

We know full well, as we look around at all the heartbreaking things happening near and far that we are living in a world of old systems seeking power and dominance, working through violence. The good news is we are planted here by God in this time and this place, to follow a different path, to be part of a different kingdom seeking beauty and harmony for the earth and all who live on it. And we are not alone on this journey of reconciliation and hope.

In my journal I jotted down these notes capturing some of the process the presenter outlined to encourage us on a way forward where we ask God to open our eyes and help us to discern God's will amid the pain we see, and perhaps are experiencing personally:

- We take time to lament what is happening. We humble ourselves in God's presence and accept the reality of all that is not right.
- We recognize we can't change things on our own. When our pride is shattered, we are better prepared to be open to discerning <u>God's</u> direction to address the complexities of structural injustice and abuses of power.
- Lament is the school of authentic hope. Authentic, Biblical, hope is anchored in discerning God's will in light of the reconciliation Jesus has already brought about. It's not about us figuring out what to do on our own it's about leaning into God's presence, at work for good, for shalom, for healing in the world.
- We ask for the Spirit to help us see signs of hope, God in action, in our daily lives.
- And we ask for courage and wisdom to take risks rooted in hope, for the sake of the world.

"I hope, Lord.

My whole being hopes,

and I wait for God's promise." (Psalm 130:5)

FALL WORSHIP @ FMC - LIVING INTO GOD'S STORY

Our fall worship series begins on September 7 with a return to the overarching story of the Bible provided by the Narrative Lectionary. This lectionary of readings begins with the story of creation in Genesis and then moves through the Old Testament leading up to Advent. After Christmas we turn our attention to walk with Jesus through the perspective of one of the four gospels (this year is John) which carries us through Easter, followed by the story of the early church, culminating in our celebration of Pentecost.

Along the way this fall, we'll add in a couple of special Sundays (including Peace Sunday, World Communion Sunday, and Mission Festival), and one final peace essay from Adrianna Peach.

We'll begin in September with several stories from the book of Genesis inviting us to realize just how different God's story is, and how our participation in it really does involve ongoing choices and decisions as there are many other powers vying for our attention and allegiance.

September 7 - Creation by the Word (Genesis 1:1-2:4a) — Pastor Tonya preaching

September 14 – Binding of Isaac (Genesis 21:1-3; 22:1-14) – Pastor Tonya preaching (+ blessing for Joy Miller as she begins as Children's Faith Formation Coordinator, and Sunday School teacher blessing, AND Bible Dedication!)

September 21 – *Jacob's Dream (Genesis 27:1-4, 15-23; 28:10-17)* – Pastor Tonya preaching (this is also Peace Sunday, with the theme from Mennonite World Conference – *The Courage to Love* based on *Matthew 22:34-40*)

FALL SUNDAY SCHOOL CLASSES for all ages begin September 7 (11am)!

Children (age 2-5th **grade) and Junior Youth (6**th-**8**th) use <u>Shine Curriculum</u> from MennoMedia. This fall's theme is: *Fall of a Kingdom*, focusing on "Calling On God – Psalms" and "Exile and Restoration – 1 & 2 Kings, Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekiel, Daniel, Ezra)".

Senior Youth (9th-12th grade) meet with Jonathan Wenger, Tanya Martin Nisly, and various other teachers (including Pastor Tonya) through the year to build community, support each other, study the Bible, theology, and Anabaptist history. We also consider baptism, discuss current events and faith, and more, depending on the year.

The Adult Class studying the Salt and Light Bible Study this fall with the theme, "Their Story, Our Story, and God's Message," written by Osheta Moore. The study will include scripture texts from Genesis, Jeremiah and John's epistles. They will be meeting in the fellowship hall and a Zoom option will be available.
