THIS WEEK @ FMC October 29-November 4, 2025

"With the bread we need for today, feed us." (New Zealand Book of Prayer – excerpt from the Lord's Prayer)

During the month of October we've been praying a different version of the prayer Jesus taught us, as found in the New Zealand Book of Prayer. I was introduced to this version during my sabbatical Transforming Community experience. Each retreat I participated in was structured around morning, afternoon, evening and night prayers, providing a solid foundation of community worship in the midst of individual spiritual deepening.

The part of the prayer I highlighted above is one I resonate deeply with every time we pray this together. We are living in a time of great uncertainty and anxiety, with difficult and traumatic news coming at us from many directions, and I truly long for God to feed each of us, all of humanity, and all our more than human kin in the earth, with the 'bread' we need for today.

One source of 'bread' I have returned to is a book of prayers I've had in my book collection since seminary – <u>Act Justly, Love Tenderly, Walk Humbly: Prayers for Peace and Justice</u> by Edward F. Gabriele (Saint Mary's Press, 1995). These morning and evening prayers are so tenderly and insightfully written, structured around the themes in the title from Micah 6:8. And, perhaps not coincidentally, he has his own paraphrase of the prayer Jesus taught ... another steady guide into deeper prayer:

Abba in heaven, Your name is holy!

> Your justice come, Your will be done, On earth as in the heavens.

> > Fill us this day
> > With all that we need.
> > Teach us to heal
> > As you have healed us.

Bring us not to the test But deliver us always From the power of evil.

You alone are God And all belongs to you!

She has written Searching for Sacred Ground: The Journey of Chief Lawrence Hart, Mennonite (2007) and East of Liberal: Notes on the Land (2022). She writes and presents these days on issues of settler accountability, dismantling the Doctrine of Discovery and advocacy for Indigenous rights. She is a member of Bethel College Mennonite Church and its Task Group for Indigenous Justice working with other Kansas churches to build an advocacy coalition, Kansas Repair Communities.

Churches are called to be places of peace, welcome, and safety for all. Yet, with recent changes to immigration enforcement policies, faith communities are facing new challenges in protecting and accompanying immigrant neighbors. Join MCC's Immigration Network for a special two-hour virtual

training designed to help your church understand immigration enforcement, know your legal rights as a faith community, and develop a plan of action in case immigration agents show up at or near your congregation. MENNONITE HISTORY TOUR TO POLAND ... BETHEL COLLEGE tour July 10-21, 2026

Poland was the refuge and homeland for generations of Mennonites during years of intolerance after the Protestant Reformation. As a result, the history of Poland is part of the history of many Mennonites around the world. As early as the 1530s, Anabaptists from Holland and the lowlands of the Rhine and North Germany found a sanctuary in the Polish Commonwealth. Unlike Switzerland and the Holy Roman Empire, Poland rejected the brutal religious persecutions plaguing Western Europe. As a result, along with others seeking religious freedom and economic opportunity, many Dutch and German Mennonites settled in Poland, and remained there until later migrations took some to Ukraine and others to the American Midwest and southern Manitoba. This tour is designed to reacquaint persons of Mennonite descent, and others, with the country that provided their ancestors a safe and secure homeland for so many years from the sixteenth through the twentieth centuries.
