THIS WEEK @ FMC November 26-December 2, 2025

We have so many choices in life, even when we feel like we don't. Over the years I've become increasingly uncomfortable with the history of this holiday we call 'Thanksgiving' as I've come to understand how for those descended from Europeans colonizing this land, it's a celebration, and for others, specifically those indigenous to this land who experienced an invasion, it's a day of mourning and grieving loss of culture, language, and people. Perhaps Thanksgiving is really an opportunity to choose to hold both grief and gratitude together in prayer, knowing we can't fix this painful history, but we can do what we can to make things better. As Richard Rohr teaches: "the best criticism of the bad is the practice of the better."

This short poem written by Rosemerry Wahtola Trommer (and shared by Diana Butler Bass in a recent post), captures this choice and tension so simply and profoundly:

one hand opens in grief
the other in gratitude
pressing them together to pray

Diana Butler Bass, in that same post, shared this Thanksgiving prayer of her own, urging us to lean into the tensions we feel in order to choose gratitude when it would be easy not to.

A Thanksgiving Prayer: We Choose Gratitude

GOD, there are many days we do not feel grateful.

When we are anxious or angry. When we feel alone. When we do not understand what is happening in the world or with our neighbors. When the news is bleak and confusing. When there are threats, injustice, violence, and war.

We struggle to *feel* grateful.

But this Thanksgiving, we *choose* gratitude.

We choose to accept life as a gift from you, and as a gift from the unfolding work of all creation.

We choose to be grateful for the earth from which our food comes; for the water that gives life; and for the air we all breathe.

We choose to thank our ancestors, those who came before us, for their stories and struggles; we will learn from their mistakes and receive their wise choices as a continuing gift for today.

We choose to see our families and friends with new eyes, accepting them for who they are.

We are thankful for our homes, whether humble or grand.

We choose to appreciate and care for our neighbors whatever our differences or how much we feel hurt or misunderstood by them.

We choose to open our hearts to those who dwell among us in the shadows of uncertainty and fear, recognizing their full dignity and humanity.

We choose to see the world as our shared commons, our home now and the legacy we will leave for generations to come.

This Thanksgiving, we do not give thanks. We choose it.

We make this choice of thanks with courage, knowing that it is humbling to say "thank you." We open ourselves to your generosity, aware that we live in a circle of gratitude. We all are guests at your table around which gifts are passed and received.

We will not let anything opposed to love take over this table.

We embrace grace, love, and the gifts of life at this table. In this choosing, and in the sharing of this meal. We are strengthened to pass gratitude on to the world.

Thus, with you God [name the sacred as is your tradition: Lord, Wisdom, Presence, Parent], with all those gathered here, and with those at tables far distant, we pledge to make thanks.

We ask you to strengthen us in this resolve.

Here, now, and into the future. Around our family table. Around the table of our nation. Around the table of the earth.

We choose thanks. Amen.

Food bank report on FMC's donations in 2025. Food items were collected at the back of the sanctuary for the first 35 weeks of 2025 with an average total of 13.97 pounds per week. Food items placed in the aisles and brought to the front of the sanctuary during children's time for the 10 weeks ending November 2 averaged 24.2 pounds per week. (The donations have increased with more of a visual presence.) The pounds dropped off on November 3 was the most for a single week this year. A worker at the Food Bank said to be sure to thank the congregation.

MENNONITE HISTORY TOUR TO POLAND ... BETHEL COLLEGE tour July 10-21, 2026

Poland was the refuge and homeland for generations of Mennonites during years of intolerance after the Protestant Reformation. As a result, the history of Poland is part of the history of many Mennonites around the world. As early as the 1530s, Anabaptists from Holland and the lowlands of the Rhine and North Germany found a sanctuary in the Polish Commonwealth. Unlike Switzerland and the Holy Roman Empire, Poland rejected the brutal religious persecutions plaguing Western Europe. As a result, along with others seeking religious freedom and economic opportunity, many Dutch and German Mennonites settled in Poland, and remained there until later migrations took some to Ukraine and others to the American Midwest and southern Manitoba. This tour is designed to reacquaint persons of Mennonite descent, and others, with the country that provided their ancestors a safe and secure homeland for so many years from the sixteenth through the twentieth centuries.
