Because of our observation of Anabaptist World Fellowship Sunday, we will not be delving deeply into this story on Sunday (but if you come to the Confessional Bible Study tonight, you will have that opportunity!). I invite you to spend time with the Prayer of Confession and Assurance below (written by Rev. Teri Peterson) as one way of considering how this story invites and challenges us, especially in the violent and painful realities we are being presented with in our country. Our call is to invite all people into new life with God, and yet we so often write the 'other' off as unlovable and even disposable. What is the 'darkness' keeping us from noticing where God's light is shining – not just for us and our 'tribe' but the whole world? May the Spirit blow us where the Spirit wants to lead us! --- *Pastor Tonya*

Prayer of Confession

You come with love, O God,
pouring yourself out for the world.

We confess that we are often quicker to condemn than to love,
and we are prone to restricting your love to those who think like us.
