Last fall our Mission Festival speaker was Raylene Hinz-Penner who spoke on the topic of land justice and dismantling the Doctrine of Discovery. The offering received that Sunday was sent to the Coalition to Dismantle the Doctrine of Discovery (<https://dismantlediscovery.org/>). Recently we received this update and personal thank you note, which is also posted on the bulletin board in the foyer.

Thank you for your donation to the Coalition to Dismantle the Doctrine of Discovery! Because of the support from members like you, the Coalition continues to advance our work for structural and cultural change. Ongoing campaigns include our accompaniment work with Oak Flat, a sacred Apache site under threat from a mining corporation; our organizing work with the Episcopal Indigenous Justice Roundtable, whose focus has been on Boarding School history; a new partnership with Shinnecock Kelp Farmers striving to protect their sovereignty and the health of the Shinnecock Bay from sewage pollution by the Hamptons; and work to reimagine what Economic Justice needs to look like to protect Indigenous sovereignty and land justice.

Our Repair Partner for 2025-2026 is our newly formed Land Justice Fund. 75% of donations to this fund will go towards land rematriation and land healing work of Indigenous partners. 25% of the fund will support capacity building for solidarity work with those partners and for the larger structural change needed.
