

THIS WEEK @ FMC - February 11-17, 2026

This week in the Narrative Lectionary we skip over quite a few chapters, landing in John 9 next Sunday with the familiar story of the man, blind from birth, who is healed by Jesus. If you have time this week, you might read the intervening chapters. These chapters include a lot of dialogue between Jesus and the Jewish leaders. It's good to remember as you read, given the ways scripture (and John in particular) have been used to support anti-Semitism, that references to 'the Jews' almost always means the 'Jewish religious leaders' ... not all Jews. In the earliest days of Christianity, most Christians were Jewish, just as Jesus and his disciples were Jewish. They just held differing views than others about the identity of the Messiah. The tone in the Gospel of John toward 'the Jews' is often harsh and negative, and this likely reflects the pain of the divisions and schisms in their community. But it was an intra-religious conflict (perhaps like we would argue among other Mennonites or Anabaptists), not an inter-religious claim about the superiority of Christianity over Judaism. That said ... here is one of the familiar stories from these chapters we are skipping over which invites us to remember God's economy of abundance (grace upon grace) and guides us toward the communion meal we will share together next Sunday:

John 6:1-14

After this Jesus went across the Galilee Sea (that is, the Tiberias Sea). ²A large crowd followed him, because they had seen the miraculous signs he had done among the sick. ³Jesus went up a mountain and sat there with his disciples. ⁴It was nearly time for Passover, the Jewish festival.

⁵Jesus looked up and saw the large crowd coming toward him. He asked Philip, "Where will we buy food to feed these people?" ⁶Jesus said this to test him, for he already knew what he was going to do.

⁷Philip replied, "More than a half year's salary^a worth of food wouldn't be enough for each person to have even a little bit." ⁸One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said, ⁹"A youth here has five barley loaves and two fish. But what good is that for a crowd like this?"

¹⁰Jesus said, "Have the people sit down." There was plenty of grass there. They sat down, about five thousand of them. ¹¹Then Jesus took the bread. When he had given thanks, he distributed it to those who were sitting there. He did the same with the fish, each getting as much as they wanted. ¹²When they had plenty to eat, he said to his disciples, "Gather up the leftover pieces, so that nothing will be wasted." ¹³So they gathered them and filled twelve baskets with the pieces of the five barley loaves that had been left over by those who had eaten. ¹⁴When the people saw that he had done a miraculous sign, they said, "This is truly the prophet who is coming into the world." ¹⁵Jesus understood that they were about to come and force him to be their king, so he took refuge again, alone on a mountain.

LENT 2026 – *Dwelling in Dissonance* (begins with Ash Wednesday on Feb 18)

This year, the entire season of Lent is framed by the experience of Holy Week as recorded in the Gospel of John. We’re invited to linger in the intensity of the final week of Jesus’ life, to dwell in the dissonance. Dissonance might be a word many of us would use to describe the kind of time we are living in, and we long to find relief from the dissonant uncertainty we are experiencing. As we anticipate the beginning of Lent, consider the invitations found in this poem:

As we step into Lent,
we say ‘welcome’ to the dissonance.
We reserve a space for lament and grief,
to stay awhile and do their work.
We release our nice little pictures
of perfect selves, perfect faith, perfect world.
and look for God in the heartache.
We listen for God in discordant melodies.
And follow Jesus to the cross,
though we don’t understand
and it doesn’t compute.
As we step into Lent,
we say ‘welcome’ to the dissonance.
Trusting that God is here.
Now. In the mystery.
Before it is resolved.

It has been a few weeks since I have given an update on the progress of the ETC Seconds on 2nd building. Remodeling has begun on the new bathrooms; doorways cut, ceiling removed in the middle portion of the building and work on the floors is to begin soon. The Builders Bargain building on 5th St is closed, and shelving is being painted and dismantled.

In order to prepare for the opening of the Seconds on 2nd building, a lot of work will need to be completed. There is no definite opening date but hopefully in 2-3 months. In order to be prepared for the opening, volunteers will need to be trained and additional volunteers will be needed as the square feet of the new building is doubled, compared to BB.
