THE ISSUES BELOW AFFECT ALL OF US . . . EVEN WHEN THEY SEEM FAR AWAY

Your vote on August 4 has impact.

The proposed amendment to the Kansas constitution on the August 4, primary ballot, will give Kansans the opportunity to decide how the Kansas Supreme Court Justices will be selected going forward. This ballot is available for all voters regardless of party affiliation. Currently, justices are carefully vetted by the selection commission and our Governor makes the appointment to fill any vacancy. By law, our justices represent each of Kansas’ four congressional districts, ensuring voices are heard from all corners of the state. Justices are accountable to the voters through retention elections, in that after serving for one year, a justice can be affirmed or voted out by a direct vote of the people of Kansas. Through this process – in effect since 1958 – the Kansas Supreme Court has proven to be fair, impartial, and beholden to the Kansas Constitution. This method has kept politics and the “big money” campaign dollars out of the selection process.

In contrast, the proposed amendment to the Kansas Constitution would return the selection process directly to a popular vote of registered voters. While that may sound like a good idea, this is what would happen. Justices would be forced to campaign for their positions. This will turn impartial justices into politicians. It would open the door for campaign funding that will inevitably influence justices to make judicial decisions that favor the big donors/corporations.

To preserve a fair, transparent and trusted justice system for all in the state of Kansas, VOTE NO on August 4. As Christians, our calling is to advocate for a society where everyone has what they need to survive and thrive and where human needs are human rights. As citizens of our state, we take action to seek justice for all.

1999 Landmark U.S. Supreme Court ruling called into question . . . from Anabaptist Disabilities Network

In this decision, *Olmstead v. L.C.*, the U.S. Supreme Court established that the unjustified segregation and institutionalization of people with disabilities and mental illness is a form of discrimination under the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). Since then, millions of people have benefited from its provisions, allowing them to live with or near family, friends, schools, and community, including their congregations. In a troubling turn of events, the U.S. Department of Justice released an opinion on June 18, 2026, questioning the constitutionality and mandates of the 1999 Supreme Court Olmstead decision. Anabaptist Disabilities Network (ADN) is deeply troubled by this recently released opinion. Anabaptists have been at the forefront of the reform of housing and support for people with disabilities and people who experience mental illness. We have advocated for everyone to live their best possible life and don’t want to go back to a time when people with disabilities and mental illness were forced to live in institutions, isolated and

separated from those who love them. It should be noted that home and community-based services are generally far less expensive than institutional care. We are concerned that the opinion could undermine the policies and funding that have improved the lives of so many people. This is a call to action. UPDATE – CENTRAL KANSAS INTERFAITH JUSTICE ORGANIZATION

The formation of the new justice ministry in Central Kansas is moving right along! I'm excited to share we have 4 from FMC who have agreed to head up our church's Justice Ministry Team – Peggy Stucky, Jane Wagler, Carol Moore and Susan Combs. You'll be hearing more from them in the coming months as we will begin the listening phase of the process in the fall. This is the process through which we'll hear stories, concerns and hopes to help us discern the issues that matter most to our communities and guide the future direction of our ministry together. Right now, nineteen congregations in Central Kansas have either recruited or are actively recruiting team leaders, and 82 team leaders have already committed to this work. Thirty laity and clergy from our region are attending a DART training in Florida in July, including our very own Peggy Stucky! It's an exciting time to be part of this new initiative seeking God's justice and abundance in our communities.

MCC invites youth to examine convictions about war

As U.S. military activity increases around the world, MCC invites teenagers and young adults to examine their beliefs about participation in war and to record their convictions on a Christian Peacemaker Registration Form. The form is one way that young men and women can build evidence of their peace witness. If the government were to reinstitute a national draft for military service, the form could be used to support a person's application to be a conscientious objector (CO) to war. A recent change in federal law allows the U.S. Selective Service System to automatically register men, ages 18-25, using government data such as social security numbers. This system will replace a requirement for men to register themselves when they turn 18, which less than 40% did. The law will go into effect in December 2026. Questions? E-MEMO: A NEWSLETTER FROM MCC U.S. NATIONAL PEACE & JUSTICE MINISTRIES

Jesus meant what he said — a conversation with Sarah Augustine (excerpt)

Sarah Augustine's name may be familiar to you. She is an Indigenous Mennonite published author, scholar, advocate, organizer, and speaker — and one who dares to take the teachings of Jesus seriously.

In a recent conversation with me on MCC's podcast Undercurrents, Sarah brought those teachings to bear on some of the most urgent questions facing people of faith today: What does the gospel actually demand of us — not just spiritually, but economically and politically? And where does our security truly come from? Pointing to Luke 4:18, Sarah roots the ministry of Jesus firmly in the tradition of the Hebrew prophets. In her words: "Jesus is coming to fulfil the prophecy of these prophets who were calling on a society to embody justice. Jesus came to liberate the poor. And he's very clear about that."

She pushed back against the tendency to soften that message — to limit Jesus' concern for prisoners and the oppressed only to cases we find sympathetic. Jesus was not offering conditional liberation: "He says, 'Release for the prisoner and freedom for the oppressed.' Not [just] if it's a cause that I agree with and it makes sense from my point of view. He's saying freedom for the oppressed and the announcement of justice, the just reordering of human systems." From there, the conversation turned to something equally challenging — the myth of individual security through personal wealth. . . . That illusion, she argued, carries devastating consequences: "I would even go further to say it's an illusion that is breaking the world — not just Christians, but all people of privilege who are saying, 'Hey, I need to have a 5% rate of return.' Really? Why? Why do we believe that we deserve to have money that we did not earn? And that money comes from extraction, which is devastating to Indigenous peoples and all peoples and creation."

And so Sarah has made a personal decision — a theological one as much as a financial one: "I personally am not willing to invest in systems that are going to exploit the life support systems we all depend on or the most vulnerable peoples. I don't want any part of that." . . . Where then does she turn? To the Psalms, and to the daily practice of trust: "I lift up my eyes to the hills. Where does my hope come from? My hope comes from the Lord, the creator of the heaven and earth. The manna that is provided to me is for today and I don't get to hold it over. It spoils and turns to ash when I try and hold it over." Sarah's prophetic voice is challenging, but this conversation is also full of hope and inspiration.
